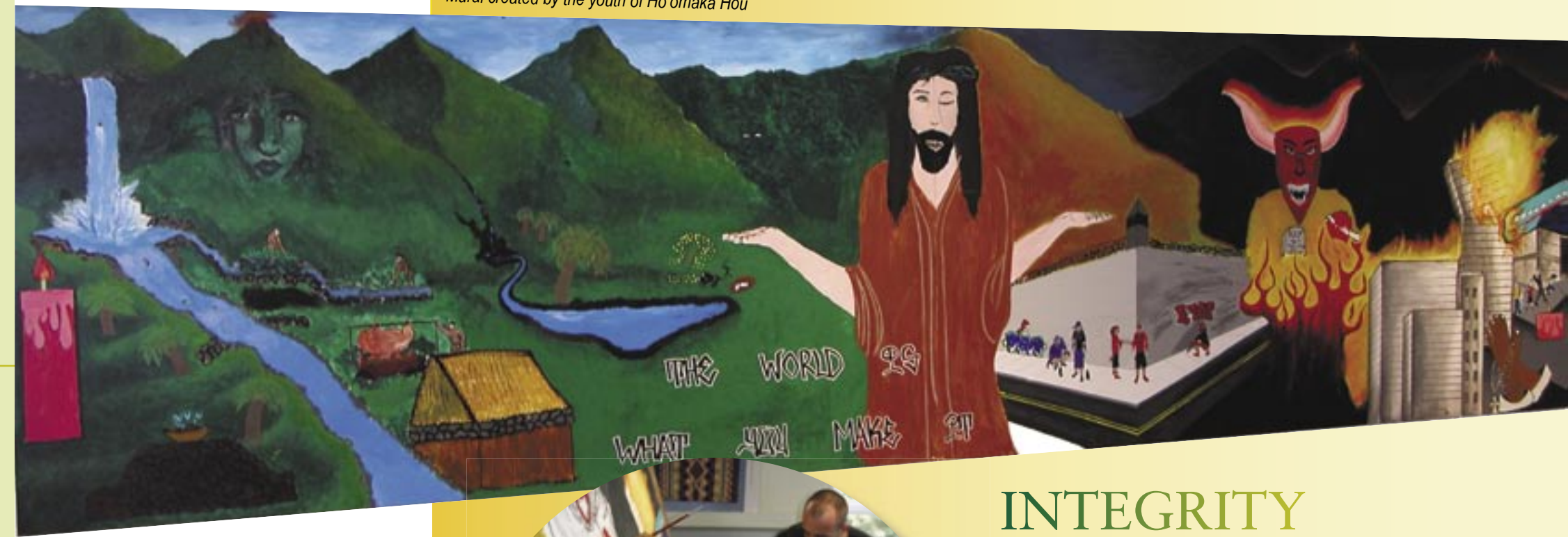

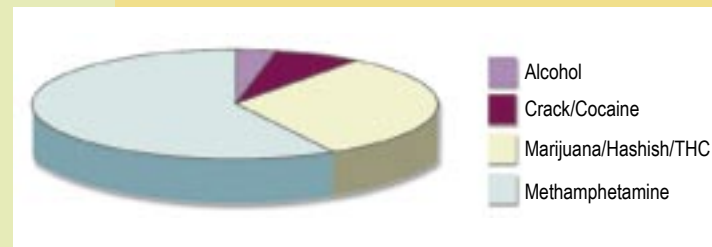

GROWING DREAMS TAKES ROOT

CELEBRATING THE ARTIST IN US

MYFS youth in treatment participated in the opening of "Celebrating the Artist in Us" by making a mural that was featured in the Maui News. The project, two 16 ft. murals, was a collaboration between Hui No'eau, the Maui Arts and Cultural Center and MYFS with foundation and county support. Artist Ari Makridakis, who worked with the youth, was extremely moved by the results. "This project was so important because it gave them a chance to have a voice and feel like they are being heard." said Makridakis. "They have a lot to teach about what is going on with the Hawaiian culture and the disempowerment they are feeling." The mural on the front of this report was painted by our Ho'omaka Hou residential youth.

LEARNING THROUGH CULTURE...AN ENHANCED APPROACH

Office of Hawaiian Affairs (OHA) gave MYFS a grant in the amount of \$24,688 to provide experiential educational activities based on Hawaiian cultural values, traditions, and practices to Hawaiian youth being treated in its Ho'o Maka Hou residential substance use disorder treatment program. The program will provide services to at least 50 Hawaiian youth. Activities will include, teaching and involving youth in the cultivation of taro for subsistence use and commercial markets; (2) provide kupuna mentors for youth participants; (3) sea voyaging experiences in cooperation with the Marimed Foundation; and (4) nature campouts that teach the values of Aloha Aina.
